

You may decide to keep your maiden name. This will require another choice later on if you have children. It is a very useful decision when both partners have children from previous marriages.

You might choose to use your maiden name professionally while legally sharing one name. This can be useful when you have valuable professional name recognition.

Hyphenating your name is yet another possibility. This is a useful way to honour both family names. Which name comes first is entirely up to you.

You might also want to do what other couples have done; create a new name. The last names Apple and Smith might become the family name Applesmith.

If you decide to legally change your name, the following checklist will assist you in addressing the primary details.



your wedding rings

There are many different wedding traditions and symbols, but the exchange of the wedding bands is one of the most beautiful. Your wedding bands are your gift to each other, a symbol of commitment; a statement to each other and to the rest of the world. As an expression of love, your rings will be worn with pride for years to come.

Your choice of jewellery is an important decision and there are many things to learn and consider before you make a selection. Assistance and information offered by a qualified jeweller or salesperson can be very valuable. You may want to visit several stores in order to find the ring that suits you best.

The promise of marriage often begins with an engagement ring. Traditionally, this ring is set with a diamond, the world's hardest gem. When purchasing a diamond, be sure to deal with a reliable and knowledgeable jeweller. Since every diamond is different and comparing them can be confusing, ask your jeweller to explain the "four C's": cut, colour, clarity and carat weight. Each of these characteristics affects the look and the value of your gems. This knowledge will help you decide what is important to you. Most jewellers will be happy to show you examples of different quality diamonds, and different cuts and shapes. When you have made a selection, ask the jeweller to have the ring

appraised by an independent gemologist of your choice.

Many couples love the idea of matching wedding bands to symbolize their commitment to each other. However, it isn't always easy to find a band that will appeal to both the bride and groom. With a little help from your jeweller, you should be able to work a pattern from a band that you like, into a band that your partner feels comfortable with. Or, instead of matching bands, the bride might choose a wedding band that nests with her engagement ring and the groom might select something complementary but not identical.

Custom designed and crafted rings are another option and their special, one-of-a-kind nature may add to your enjoyment. The process of designing and making a ring is one in which you can be involved from start to finish. A designer usually makes a wax model of the ring first. This is a necessary step in the design process and also gives you an opportunity to view the result of your creativity and make any changes before the actual ring is made.

Whether choosing a ring or designing a ring, make sure you consider the comfort and practicality as well as the look. After all, you'll be wearing it for a long time and in many different situations. Comfort is essential, not only in proper sizing, but also in styling. Ensure that your ring doesn't snag your clothing.

married in ONTARIO

In Ontario, you can get married if you're eighteen or older. No one under sixteen can marry. If you're sixteen or seventeen, you need written consent from your parents or quardian.

A marriage can be performed under the authority of a marriage licence or the publication of banns. The publication of banns is valid if you both worship regularly at your own church in Canada, and if neither of you has been divorced.

A marriage licence can be obtained through the Municipal Clerk's office. Both of you must sign the application, and at least one of you must apply in person. If only one of you appears in person, you must have proof of age of the other person. You don't need blood tests, medical certificate, or proof of residency. Two pieces of identification are required; a birth certificate and a current passport. Records of Immigrant landing or Canadian Citizenship Card along with photo identification must be presented.

A marriage licence is valid anywhere in Ontario for three months after it is issued. It is not valid until the third day after it is issued, although special exceptions can be made in some

A marriage can be performed by a minister, a member of the clergy who is registered under the Marriage Act, a judge, or a justice of the peace. You must have a marriage licence in order to have a civil ceremony performed by a judge or a justice of the peace. You must arrange for two witnesses to be present at the ceremony.

If either of you have been married before, you must provide certain documents that prove the marriage was dissolved or annulled or that the former spouse is deceased. Call the local municipal offices below for more information.

who pays for what?

Tradition, a weighty word. In terms of wedding expenses, it once dictated that the bride's family handled all the nuptial expenses. The changing scheme of society has made it possible for some ironclad traditions to loosen their grip a bit, and that certainly includes wedding costs. The most useful approach for you and your respective families to consider when you draw up the wedding budget is to be communicative, realistic and courteous. If your family is unable to bear the traditional bridal bill, talk with the groom's parents. They may be willing to assume a portion of the financial responsibility. There are probably some expenses that you and your groom can pay, thus taking some of pressure off your families.

What follows is the traditional division of nuptial expenses. However, there are times when tradition bows to practicality. The question of who pays for what really boils down to who is most willing and able.

With couples marrying at a later age, many are financially capable and willing to pay for their own wedding. In fact, there are no "standard" divisions. Some of the more creative ways of paying for the wedding are to split it three ways between bride and groom, bride's parents and groom's parents.

Another feasible division is for each segment to pay proportionately for the number of guests each invites; for example, couple pays for ½ the reception because 1/2 the guests are their friends. Each set of parents pays for their portion of the guests, because that is how many they have invited.

wedding coordinator

Planning a wedding from concept to completion can be a full-time commitment.

For those of you who don't have the time to plan and shop for everything, or if your plans entail a large scale wedding, that you might need help with, a wedding coordinator may be the perfect solution for you. Often times, the stress of planning your wedding puts unnecessary strain on everyone involved.

Wedding coordinators are specialists who can make the arrangements from invitations and catering to flowers and entertainment. They will listen to your ideas, give you unbiased opinions about options and then, help you make them a reality. Like any of the decisions associated with your wedding, it is important to find a coordinator you feel a good fit with; both on a conceptual and

an operational level. It is important to be upfront with them about your budget and what items are priorities for you and your future spouse. Also, as with any wedding vendor, make sure they understand their responsibilities and, have their fees spelled out clearly in the contract you sign.

You may choose to use your coordinator's experience and resources to arrange all or part of your wedding. They will work with you to understand you style and match it with the appropriate wedding service providers in your area. They are familiar with the latest trends in weddings, have experience and are well-versed in all points of social etiquette.

Your coordinator will stay in close contact with you throughout the entire process, so all details and preparations can be dealt with, as they arise and according to a comfortable schedule that is both financially and time sensitive. Be responsive to your coordinator's communications, so that you will both stay on track with your wedding planning.

The wedding coordinator can also be a vital part of orchestrating your wedding, as the go-to-person on the actual day of the event– anticipating issues that may arise, facilitating the flow of events as they are happening, and putting out any fires before you even get a hint that something isn't what or where it should be. Having that supervision will insure a worry-free day for the two of you, as well as any family or friends, that might have ended up dealing with any difficulties.

Though many think a wedding coordinator is a luxury that only the wealthiest of brides can afford, oftentimes, they can save you money in the long run. Their frequent work with wedding professionals can make them, and you as their client, privy to certain rates and discounts that are not available to the general consumer. They are a wise investment for the time-limited, cost conscious couple. When you invest in a wedding coordinator, you will be assured that your wedding will be well-organized, gracious and fun for all.

The processional and altar lineups for formal Christian and Jewish weddings are illustrated below. During the Christian ceremony, the bride meets the groom at the altar, and her parents remain seated throughout the wedding service. In the Jewish wedding, the bridal couple is escorted down the aisle by both sets of parents who remain standing during the ceremony.

Traditionally, the bride's family and guests sit on the left and the groom's on the right. If one of you are expecting more guests than the other, you should ask guests to sit evenly distributed throughout the church.

You may choose to reserve seats for your immediate family. Seats can be reserved by marking them with ribbons or flowers.

The first and second rows are reserved for immediate family, parents, siblings and grandparents. If your parents are divorced, the parent you lived with sits in the first row with your stepparent. Your other parent and their family sit in the second row. The third through six rows are usually reserved for uncles, aunts, cousins, godparents and any other special quests.

In a Christian ceremony, the mother of the bride's family is seated on the left (when the guests enter from the back). The groom's family is seated on the right. For a Jewish wedding, it is reversed. If either the bride or groom have a much larger family than the other, it is a good idea to seat the guests on either side so it looks balanced.

For a formal wedding, the ushers will escort the female guests to their seats while her male escort follows them. For an informal ceremony, the ushers can greet your guests at the door and say, "Please follow me". For every 50 quests, you should have one usher.



Your Wedding Day mood will be filtered through the ambience of your locale. The backdrop for your photos and video are impacted by the surroundings you select. Choose wisely.

plan ahead for your RECEPTION

How many times in your life have you volunteered to plan a party for 150 or more of your closest friends with you as the guest of honour?

Your wedding day is likely the only time you'll be in charge of such a momentous event. Follow a few guidelines and you'll avoid many inadvertent and untimely gaffes invited by a lack of planning.

- ♥ First and foremost, ask to visit your reception facility during another wedding so that you can observe an actual wedding taking place.
- Choose the site and the food for your reception according to the time of the year your wedding takes place. Serve food that is appropriate for the time of day as well as the season.
- ♥ Include an RSVP card in your invitation so you can provide an accurate guest count to the reception facility. Plan to do this two weeks before your wedding, even though you may be updating this list often.
- Obscuss seating arrangements with your banquet coordinator at the reception site. You can seat your guests however you wish; there are no hard and fast rules. Prepare for any surprise guests and last minute changes.
- Making your guests work doesn't necessarily mean you're saving yourself any money. Buffet service often costs more than a sit-down meal. A greater variety of dishes are typically offered to start with, and platters constantly need to be replenished.
- ♥ If you are having a master of ceremonies, be sure they are clear on what their role is and what you want to be announced. Discuss these important details in advance.
- Thave the musicians or DJ play a variety of music so that everyone can enjoy dancing at your reception. Discuss special requests and dances in advance.

- On not require your guests to pay for their own drinks. If you decide against an open bar, consider serving only wine, champagne, mineral water or soft drinks.
- Openot allow bartenders to put out tip jars. Whoever is paying for the reception should handle the gratuities.
- Assign a friend or family member to transport gifts from the reception to your residence. Gifts and money should be placed in a secure room at the reception to prevent loss or theft.
- notice any conspicuous absence.
- ♥ Instead of numbering your tables, try naming them. For example, an avid reader marrying an outdoor enthusiast might have tables named "Grisham & Golfing Table" and "Hemingway and Hiking Table."
- Provide a map showing locations of guest hotels, parents' homes, rehearsal dinner and reception facilities as well as the ceremony site is an absolute necessity for your quest.
- Emphasize well-marked main routes; indicate available parking areas. Include maps with invitations and have additional copies available at the ceremony.

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your wedding reception

The wedding reception will be the first time you receive your relatives and friends as a married couple. It can be one of the most joyous parties you and your spouse will ever host.

The reception may be simple, or it can encompass a full course dinner and dance.

Depending on your budget, you may want to consider a sit down meal or buffet style, whatever suits your style.

Because your reception can be held almost anywhere, your first consideration in choosing a site is accommodating the number of guests you are inviting. Your church, synagogue or place of worship may have a suitable area, or you may want to rent a banquet hall, a hotel ballroom, a golf course, a winery, a restaurant or even a yacht. Indoors or out, there are many different places that weddings are now being held at.

If you're being married in a season and locale noted for good, reliable weather, there may be a lovely garden or arboretum available. Also consider a restored mansion. They make delightful fairy tale backdrops for a bespoke wedding celebration.

Once you've decided the setting, the estimated number of guests and the budget, you're ready to begin interviewing reception sites and caterers.

Remember that the services of a professional banquet facility or caterer can enhance and expedite the planning of your reception. Reserve your reception spot well in advance and promptly pay any necessary deposit to secure your date.

Visit the reception site and map out how you'd like it arranged. Plan the receiving line, (if you are having one), where the guests will be entering and decide whether the line will be formal or semi-formal. Today, not everyone in the wedding party has to be included; the choice is yours. A wedding decorator may be hired to look after all the details for you.

There will be a head table for the wedding party where the seating arrangements are as follows: couple in the centre, maid of honour at the groom's left, best man at the bride's right. Other attendants alternating men and women are seated as space allows.

Some newly married couples are opting for a sweetheart table, where they can share their first married meal together with the finest of china and crystal. In this instance, the wedding party would be seated at their own table.

Once all have been served their meal, the best man presents the traditional toast to the bridal couple. The couple may then want to respond with additional toasts. Try to keep them short and tasteful, approximately five minutes per toast is appropriate.

Cake-cutting comes after dinner is completed and once it's over, it signifies that the dinner hour is over and the party will begin. Ensure your cake has a spot of honour in a nice setting, because this is a well photographed place. The couple cuts the first slice together and shares it with one another. Then, the cake is served to the guests, while the couple visits with their invited guests, going from table to table, thanking everyone for attending their big day.

A midnight supper may follow and the menu can be pierogi, cabbage rolls, stuffed peppers, sliders, milk and cookies—whatever fare you decide that your guests will love!

Before the newlyweds take leave of the reception hall, the bride will toss her bouquet and the groom will fling the garter.

Finally, the couple leave the reception for a honeymoon or a night in a hotel, accompanied by best wishes of your families and friends for peace, prosperity and happiness in your life together.

It is no secret that, at one time or another, every bride-to-be has dreamed of a garden wedding. Whether she has grown up in a big urban city or small rural town, the thought of an outdoor wedding conjures up feelings of romance and "...an outdoor happiness.

The wonderful thing about a garden wedding is that it can be simple or elaborate. Whatever your budget, an outdoor ceremony can be magical. Imagine walking down a long white runner, sprinkled with rose petals, hearing the birds sing overhead, and seeing the man of your dreams, standing under a flower-filled gazebo.

If the wedding is to take place at sundown, twinkling white lights in the trees and around the gazebo can add a special touch.

Location and atmosphere are especially important for an outdoor wedding. Your special place must be able to accommodate a wedding.

Whether you are interested in a hotel, park, or country club, find out which facilities are readily available and what arrangements need to be made to use them.

> Many facilities charge an hourly fee for their use—quite often with a time limit. The fee usually includes the set-up, and take-down of chairs. Some facilities even offer a tented option as a back-up plan if the weather isn't perfect.

Your wedding location should have a few good spots for professional photographs to be taken before or after the ceremony. For example, photographs in front of a gazebo or garden always come out beautiful and colourful.

So, if you are planning a wedding and cannot decide where to host it, check out your local outdoor wedding facilities. Some reception sites also offer outdoor ceremony options.

With a little planning, a garden wedding can be even more romantic than you've ever imagined.

take it outdoors

If you are planning an outdoor event, the sky is the limit —but it can also be limiting if nature decides to present you with a wedding shower! However, don't let the uncertainty of the weather dissuade you from holding your dream wedding in your favourite outdoor place.

Consider a canopy or tent to protect your guests from bright sun or rain. Lights, fountains, or other decorations can be easily added to make your outdoor wedding site into something truly spectacular. Many weddings and receptions are held outdoors, but natural scenery also provides nice atmosphere for a rehearsal dinner or gift opening party.

A canopy will add a festive touch to your celebration and provide a focal point as well. Besides providing a dramatic backdrop, it also gives you practical weather protection. Your rental agency will be able to answer all your questions about cost, delivery, and set-up. They will also

help you calculate the size you need, based on the number of guests and whether or not you plan seated or buffet dining and dancing.

A wooden dance floor can be added; or you might choose artificial turf. Either will provide a clean, dry surface and protect the lawn underneath. A clear roll-down rain shield or a solid screen will block the sun and keep your event more private. Some of today's white "wedding tents" have lovely arched windows with clear acrylic panes. Furnish your outdoor room with chairs and tables from your rental agency.

They can also provide linens, a portable bar, punch bowl, a buffet service, and china, crystal, flatware and champagne and chocolate fountains. Decorate with twinkle lights or lanterns, balloons, flowers, streamers or even caged birds. Place potted plants around tent stakes so guests won't trip on them.

The bridal shower is a traditional celebration that allows family and friends to show their affection and "shower" the bride with gifts. The shower occurs from two months to two weeks before the wedding and can be anything from an informal luncheon at the workplace to a dinner in an elegant restaurant.

Anyone who wants to do something for the bride may host a shower, even a group of two or three friends can act as co-hostesses. One rule is that immediate family members (mothers, sisters, mother-in-law) should not host showers because it appears that the family is soliciting gifts.

The hostess can set the limit on the number of guests, since she will be paying the bill. No one should be invited to the shower who has not been invited to the wedding, or who does not know the couple.

One of the bride's responsibilities as far as her shower goes, is to provide the hostess with a quest list and to make sure that she hasn't created a financial burden on someone by inviting them to more than one or two showers. She should also send a written note of thanks to her guests for any presents received, as well as to the hostess(es) for their hospitality.

BEVERAGES

Discuss what beverages you want served at your reception with both families, no matter who will be paying the bill. Ask a liquor store/winery or reception consultant to help you with choices and options. Consider both cost and the number of quests.

You may also want to create a signature cocktail that is unique to your wedding theme. It adds a special touch to your reception, as well as being memorable, or serve a local craft beer.

If your reception facility is furnishing beverages, ask how you will be charged- by the glass, by the bottle or per person.

While champagne is traditionally the festive drink used to toast the bride and groom, wine often serves to complement the wedding meal. Good tasting wines and champagnes come in all price ranges. Buy the best selection that your budget allows.

Hosting a wine tasting party for your attendants is a fun way to choose wedding wines.

Recent surveys indicate that a lot of guests don't drink alcohol, so offer a selection of non-alcoholic wines, soft drinks and espresso or coffee drinks.

Should you decide to serve your guests cocktails, you can include an open bar before and after dinner. Offer guests their choice of beverages, including local and imported beer and wine.

If you are hosting your party in a private home or space, hire experienced bartenders. You can depend on them to pour standard drinks. Have them track liquor use so that you can account for your bar expense. And, of course, ensure that they are Smart-Serve according to the laws of the province.

If you decide to keep the bar open after dinner, close it at least one hour before guests prepare to leave. Serve coffee and non-alcoholic beverages after that time to ensure everyone goes home safely. Alcohol liability is an important issue, and one way to protect yourself and your guests is to hire a licensed company to provide security. They will oversee any potential problems with alcohol as well as protecting your gifts, including cash from being stolen.

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wedding TONS

You may be interested in the origins of some popular traditions included in observing marriage.

Bridal gowns, for example are white because the Greeks believed white embodied purity, innocence, and joyfulness. Wedding veils have always symbolized modesty, privacy, youth and maidenhood. That way of thinking still has a foothold; bridal authorities today advise to skip the veil and perhaps wear a hat instead if it suits your style.

Most are familiar with a poem about bridal attire: "Something old, something new, something borrowed something blue and a lucky sixpence in your shoe." What's not generally known is that if a bride borrows an item from a happily married woman, the giver's happiness is said to be passed on to the bride. Something blue symbolizes constancy in a relationship.

The bridal garter originates from at least two cultures. In ancient times, it represented the virginal girdle; the groom's removal of the garter symbolized her relinquishment of that status. The garter can also be traced to the old English

custom of flinging the stocking. Wedding guests would sneak into the bridal chamber, pick up the newlywed's discarded stockings and throw them at the couple. Whoever flung a stocking that hung on the bride or groom's nose would be the next to

Wedding bands, symbolizing eternal love by their lack of a beginning or an end, grew out of an ancient tribal custom of using circlets of grass to decorate a bride's wrists and ankles. The Romans and Egyptians with their love of precious metals and stones, initiated the practice of using silver and gold. Rings are worn yet today on the third finger of the left hand, because ancient cultures believed that finger had a vein running straight to the heart.

Old shoes tied to the honeymoon car were once considered symbols of authority and possession. The bride's father would contribute one of the bride's old shoes to the groom, thus symbolizing the transference of authority over to the husband.

The "throwing of rice" at fleeing newlyweds is a traditional way of wishing them many children.

beverage GUIDELINES

If you are serving alcohol at your reception, you have several options:

Open bar: full bar where you pay for all the drinks Limited bar: you set limit and pay for what is served

Signature drink: a special drink or pair of drinks hosted, quests pay for other drinks

Cash bar: service that is available to your quests and they pay for the drinks themselves

Partial cash bar: one or more items (beer or wine) hosted, larger variety paid for by quests

The age of the group affects the amount of liquor consumed. Buy from a professional who specializes in selling beverages or get help from the catering manager at your reception facility. They can determine what you will need. Hire a professional bartender, sommelier, or bartending service or consult with a sommelier.

What To Serve:

Most importantly, know your crowd. The ratios of wine to beer to mixed drinks will shift depending on the preferred drink of choice for your friends and family. An experienced professional bartender or sommelier can guide you in making the right choices based on the tastes of your guests.

Wine: select at least one white and one red, if you would like a third option you can add a rosé. You may opt for two reds and two whites, a medium-to-light body and a full-body, however you do want to keep your choices narrow. Divide your purchase so 60-65% of the wine is white wine and 35-40% is red. If you decide on a rose, 20% of the wine should be rose, 45% white wine, and 35% red wine.

Sparkling wine: Champagne is always an option but it can be pricy. Other delicious choices that are easier on the budget include Prosecco (Italy), Cava (Spain), Cremants (sparkling made the same way as Champagne from other regions of France), and Ontario sparkling wine.

Sommelier Tip: For the sparkling toast, plan 1 bottle for every 10 guests and ask the catering staff for 2 oz. pours. Most guests will take an obligatory sip then return to whatever it is they are drinking.

Beer: you will want to have at least two options, a darker style beer and a lighter style beer. If you know you are going to have a lot of craft beer drinkers as guests, then select four distinct styles of beer.

Mixed drinks: decide on a limited cocktail list to keep things simple. A modified full bar includes whiskey, gin, and vodka with tequila and rum optional. Mixers include juice (orange and cranberry), cola (Coke, Sprite, Ginger Ale), tonic water, and club soda. Garnishes include lemon and lime.

How Much To Serve:

For the average event with wine, beer, and mixed drinks, 50% of all alcohol is wine, 20% is beer, and 30% is mixed drinks. If you are going to have beer and wine only, plan on 70% wine and 30% beer. Above all, know your crowd.

Determining how much to buy can be a daunting task. There is a simple formula to determine how much alcohol will be consumed:

Number of Guests x 1.5 x Hours of Service = Total Number of Drinks

For example, if you expect 100 quests for a 3-hour reception, you will need to plan on 500 drinks. You should purchase 40 x 750ml bottles of Wine; 8 x 750ml bottles of Spirit; 14 x 6-packs of Beer; 15 x 750ml bottles of Champagne/Sparkling Wine

When to Serve:

During the cocktail hour preceding dinner - mixed drinks, Champagne/sparkling, wine, beer, soft drinks

During bridal toast – Champagne/sparkling or non-alcoholic cider

With sit-down dinner – wine, 2 bottles, 1 red and 1 white, on each table

Near the cake table – Champagne/sparkling or punch, ice wine

During the reception – mixed drinks, wine, beer, soft drinks

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rehearsal DINNER

A dinner following the wedding rehearsal is not a necessity, but it is a lovely way to begin your wedding festivities and allows your attendants and families to relax and get acquainted.

The meal is traditionally hosted by the groom's parents, and includes the immediate family of both the bride and groom, the clergyman and members of the wedding party and their spouses. In some circumstances, you may want to include special and out-of-town guests who have already arrived.

The rehearsal dinner is the traditional time for the groom's father to make a formal toast to the couple. It is also an appropriate time for the attendants' gifts to be given out. Seating plans and place cards are especially important at this dinner, probably a first meeting for more than one of the group. The bridal couple generally sits at the head of the group, their parents flank them. The members of the wedding party are seated throughout the rest of the family members and special guests. Presumably, they will feel more at

ease and be able to assist in making the other quests more comfortable.

Because it is an icebreaker of sorts, relax and enjoy the rehearsal dinner. Don't linger too long, however. Brides look terrible with bleary eyes. Get home early and pamper yourself tonight- for tomorrow you'll be married!

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how to cut your WFDDING CAKE

Your baker will give you cutting instructions. When you make the first cut, hold the knife in your right hand. The groom's hand closes over the bride's together cutting a slice and then sharing it. This tradition evolves from an ancient Greek custom where a couple share a sesame seed cake to ensure that their marriage would be fruitful.

After creating an edible masterpiece, of course you want each individual piece to look beautiful as it arrives on the table. Traditionally the cake is cut to show off the decorations and patterns of frosting; see our diagram alongside this article.

Traditionally, the top layer of the cake is set aside and not served to guests; it is frozen and enjoyed by the couple when they celebrate their first anniversary. You might also choose to share it with special family members who were unable to attend the wedding or another celebration after your honeymoon.

With a little care and know-how, the wedding cake will look as beautiful and as appetizing after being cut as before. After the bride and groom have made their first cuts, the following directions will help the person in charge of the cake cutting. Remember you probably will not cut the entire cake.

The first step is to use the correct knife. Always use a sharp, thin, knife. The cut should be made by first inserting the knife straight down into the cake. The next step is to pull the knife at an angle toward the outer edge. Before the next cut, wipe the knife clean with a damp cloth.

Cutting a tiered cake is challenging, but it can be a simple task. First, "free" only the exposed part of the bottom layer. Carefully cut the first layer away from the second layer by running the knife through the bottom layer around the edge of the second layer. Then, cut the "freed" part of the bottom layer into wedges or squares. Wedges are recommended for large circles, while rectangles work better for smaller layers.

Next, cut the exposed part of the second layer exactly as the first layer, using third the layer as the cutting guide. Remember to cut through only one layer at a time. Do not cut the remaining part of the bottom layer at this time. When the top is reached, return to the bottom layer and start over, this time

using the newly exposed outer edge of the second layer as the cutting guide.


Remember the top layer is usually saved for your first anniversary. It is recommended the saved be covered first and frozen over night at which point it should be sealed in plastic wrap and placed in an airtight container and frozen for best results.

Instructions are for a traditionally-tiered cake of "normal" tier graduation. Cutting directions for serving while cake is viewed from front by guests.


1. Make a semi-circle cut in "next-to-edge" tier in the same diameter and position as the top



2. Cut slices approximately 1" wide x 2" deep. Serve slices from the "server" side of cake, serving approximately half of the tier.



3. Cut the next tierdown in a semi-circle, following the edge of the tier above (from which you have just served). Cut and serve these slices also about halfway around the cake.



4. When "back-side" of all tiers to be served are cut, remove top tier and put aside. Continue serving rest of the second tier, then the third and so on.

traditional groom's cake

The Groom's Cake is a special way of honouring the groom. It is usually a gift from the bride to the groom, and, traditionally it is a dark cake of either fruits and nuts or soaked in liquor.

The cake may be presented any time during the wedding celebration, and it is also nice served as a toast to the groom at the rehearsal dinner to be enjoyed and shared in an intimate tribute to the wedding attendants and special guests. Or, serve it at the reception as a second flavour choice of cake for your guests.

Special boxed miniature groom's cakes are also a nice touch, and make a sweet gift for your attendants. This follows the superstition that a maiden who sleeps with a slice of groom's cake under her pillow will dream of her future partner.

Tradition also dictates that a bride who keeps a piece of her wedding cake will have a faithful and loving husband.



One of the nicest traditions of all is that of saving part of the wedding cake to share on your first anniversary. Before the advent of the freezer, the groom's cake was always the cake reserved for this occasion, as the heavy fruit and liquor soaked cakes are preserved and carry a very long shelf life.

Many traditions are focused on the bride. By including a groom's cake as part of your wedding is a nice way to honour your groom. The cake can be modeled after a hobby, sports, or something that is important to the groom.


DESSERTS

There is more to nuptial desserts than wedding cake. A sweet table is everything to dessert lovers- and a good choice for couples who want to serve more than just their wedding cake.

Your own mini-buffet might include an array of pastries, tarts, cakes, confections, and frozen desserts. Cupcakes are still a big favourite as are cake balls. Macarons, an almond treat, coloured to your theme, can be filled with gelato or ice cream are also gaining popularity. Remember to include some fruit and sugarless treats for guests on restricted diets.

The candy buffet is a new feature with its assortment of jelly beans and other candy treats! They provide a colourful impact and enticing display for everyone with a sweet tooth.

While a sweet table doesn't replace your wedding cake, you may opt for a smaller version. Your guests may want to save room for sampling while they socialize and linger near the goodies, as they decide on their choices.



rooms get IVOIVED

The days of the groom being responsible only for the rehearsal dinner, booking the honeymoon and showing up on time for the weddings are long gone. Today's groom is involved in almost every aspect of your wedding planning.

With today's belief that marriage is an equal partnership, most men feel wedding responsibilities should also be shared equally. As men become more involved, traditional wedding duties are changing.

Many newlyweds today not only both work full-time, but they share housekeeping duties as well. Because of this, the groom is being included in many bridal showers. Theme showers which include interests of both the bride and groom have become very popular. Be sure to invite his male relatives and friends.

The groom is also becoming more involved in the financial aspects of the wedding. With couples marrying at an older age, most are paying for their own weddings or contribute toward toward their parents' wedding expenses

After the wedding, the groom may take on the responsibility of writing thank you notes to his family and friends, while the bride will send thank you notes to her family and friends.

One of the oldest marriage traditions has changed dramatically through the years. The bride is not required to change her name after the wedding; many retain their maiden name or use both names hyphenated. Many grooms are making changes in their names, also. The last name of the bride and groom may both be used as a celebration of their lifelong commitment.

The continuing changing roles of men and women are indeed having an effect on the traditional wedding. We are seeing a "Best Woman" in place of the "Best Man," female ushers, and Groom's showers. This crossing of traditional barriers is allowing today's bride and groom to share everything about their wedding, as well as their life together.

formal wear PROTOCOL

A beautifully dressed bride requires a handsomely suited groom. When choosing a tux, note the time of day and the season in which the wedding will take place. A morning wedding with a brunch reception will require much less formal attire than a late evening ceremony and formal sit-down meal.

Keep in mind the style and formality of the bride and her attendants' attire to choose appropriate formal wear. An experienced formal wear shop can guide you successfully through these choices.

The basic elements of a groom's outfit may include a jacket, pants, shirt, bow tie, vest or cummerbund, suspenders, pocket handkerchief, socks and shoes. Special shoes are often worn with tuxedos and can be found at formalwear shops for purchase or rental.

Many options are available to fill out the groom's attire. In addition to all the new styling and fabrics for today's tuxedos, high-fashion accessories include ties, suspenders, cummerbund, shirts that preclude bowties, cuff links and shirt studs in almost any style you can imagine. Choose designs and accessories to suit your own style and express your unique personality. If you prefer to play it safe, a traditional black and white tuxedo ensemble never goes out of style, giving you the added confidence that you will look and feel your best on your wedding day.

Visit the formal wear shop four months before the wedding. Bring along swatches of the bridesmaids' gowns if you plan to coordinate the groomsmen's tuxes. While formal wear shops provide measurement forms for out-of-town grooms and attendants to complete, the danger of confusing or incorrect measurements increases. It is best to get the groom and his men into the shop to be measured in person.



Images are not the place to trim your budget. Their value grows every year. Few events inspire your loved ones to come together in celebration like your wedding will.



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how to choose your photographer

Your wedding is one of the most important days of your life, and, the services of a professional photographer can capture those moments for you to treasure forever.

When sourcing the services of a photographer, check references. If you have any doubts about the reputation of the photographer, ask to see samples of their work and check for quality and style, does it appeal to you? Decide on what is important to the two of you as a couple. Do you prefer candid or posed shots, and, communicate to the photographer exactly what your needs are and the shots that you are looking for. Make a list of the people whose photos are absolutely important to have captured that day.

When interviewing a photographer, look for experience, first and foremost. Other areas of expertise that are important are as follows; listening ability, compatibility, diplomacy, stamina, an intuitive, caring person, a good memory and a photographs storyteller.

The key to great photos is to communicate with your photographer. Make sure you ask all the questions that are important to you. The important question to ask is "do you shoot traditional or non-traditional photography?"

From your Save the Date images to your engagement and wedding, you'll want to have a good relationship with your photographer. Your comfort level and chemistry will shine through the pictures, if you are relaxed and comfortable with them.

Wedding photography has evolved dramatically through the years. With everything digital; from the camera to the album, couples are more aware of how the photographer captures the day's events, how and if they are being printed, (should you want this service) and how and if they are being manipulated with imaging software.

Discuss, too, if you want a plugged or an unplugged ceremony. Today most couples prefer the guiet intimacy of the ceremony, without any

added distraction. A professional photographer has been trained to be unobtrusive, while capturing those defining emotions. They will take those shots that will be yours forever- and they will get the best ones. Guests should refrain from photographing, if that is your wish.

To produce more personal photos of you and your fiancé, it is important to share your history with your photographer. When did the two of you meet, what part of the day is most important to you, what candid shots must you have, do you have an extended family, and if so, are there pictures that you absolutely have to have? Will the evening be ending with any special moments or surprises that you want documented?

When you compare photography packages, you'll find that it may be as difficult as trying to read a

> foreign language! You must ask what you will be receiving as the finished product, and know exactly what you want. Ensure you have a checklist and a contract.

There are pros and cons to consider when you discuss traditional and non-traditional photography. In today's social world, you and your guests will want to post, as well as email photos to friends and family.

Traditional packages still have their place in wedding photography, as the demand has not declined. Some couples still want a traditional album that will be revered and passed on from generation to generation. Other's don't.

Ultimately, when choosing your photographer, you must like their "style." The biggest difference in style can be see with classical portraits or spur of the moment candid photos. Your images will literally be a reflection of the two of you.

Keep in mind that your wedding pictures are an investment in memories; one of the only ways to capture the treasured moments of your special day. Once the day is over, there are no make-overs, so be very particular who you hire.

No two weddings are alike. The bride comes first. Feed the photographer and remember to bask in your day!

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your wedding PHOTOGRAPHY

Don't err on the side of politeness or economy when relatives or friends volunteer to take your wedding photographs. Get a professional who is skilled at creatively capturing the tender, joyful and humourous moments of your wedding and reception.

Contract your photographer at least eight to twelve months prior to your wedding. Visit the studio, review portfolios, and talk about how you envision the pictures of your wedding day. At this meeting, clearly determine your photography budget, remembering to include additional prints you might want to give as gifts later. Agree on a firm figure for both the deposit and the final payment, and pay both promptly.

Discuss with your photographer the type of wedding you're planning, its location, and the times of the ceremony and reception. Be sure the photographer is aware of any restrictions by your religious institution.

Do not fail to discuss where and when to take formal portraits. Professionals usually agree that taking formal pictures right after the ceremony can dampen the spontaneity of the reception. Taking all formal groupings before the ceremony may relieve much of the tension and pressure that would be experienced in the rush afterwards, so discuss this and allow your photographer's extensive experience to guide you in deciding the best time for this important photographic session.

If you wedding party is large or if you have large families, you may want to appoint a photographer's assistant from each family. This person should know everyone in the family by sight, and be able to assist the photographer by making sure all essential family groupings are taken.

Don't forget to inform your photographer of any sensitive situations in your respective families, such as recently deceased members or divorced parents, step parents, etc.

The photography contract is a complex one. Be sure you and the photographer understand exactly what you are ordering in terms of quantity and size of photos you will be purchasing and when the finished work will be ready.

Once you are satisfied that you have conveyed all your wishes, relax and let the photographer fulfill them. A professional photographer will gently control the formal posing, unobtrusively capture the candid moments, and produce an album that genuinely reflects the love and happiness you and your families share on your wedding day.

Choosing the right location for your wedding photographs is as important as choosing the right photographer.

There will be photos of your engagement, your beautiful ceremony and of course, your reception and you will want them to genuinely reflect the personality of you and your spouse.

Today's couples are choosing many unique locations for their picture-taking, from scenic sandy shorelines to historic and majestic mansions. Well-manicured city parks with elegant gardens and flower beds are also a favourite locale.

Some couples prefer edgy and artistic settings with graffiti backgrounds and urban city landscapes, while others favour the countryside with soft fields and fauna.

Depending on your professions or hobbies, you may want your pictures staged with antique, vintage automobiles or other unique vehicles.

Whether you are looking for candid poses or more formal portraiture, speak with your photographer about locations that appeal to you. You may find that they may have some wonderful, "secret" spots that they will share especially with you!

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tips for great photos

Have all your wedding images transferred to disc for safest storage.

Have your photographer arrange for an online ordering service so guests can order wedding photos on his or her own.

Arrange for food or snacks to be available during pre-ceremony pictures with your attendants, especially if there is a lot of time between the ceremony and reception. Keep the alcohol to a minimum.

Meet the photographer who will photograph your wedding. It is important you like him/her as you'll be spending the entire day with them.

Think about what you want to say to the videographer on tape before the wedding- that way you won't be caught off-guard during the excitement of the day.

Place a collage of pictures of each of you from birth to the present at the rehearsal dinner.

Show a video montage of photos of you and your new spouse at the reception. These can tell a story from baby photos up to how you met and how you got engaged. "To keep the fire burning brightly there's one easy rule: Keep the two logs together, near enough to keep each other warm and far enough apart – about a finger's breadth – for breathing room. Good fire, good marriage, same rule."

choosing a DJ

Not all DJ's are alike. in fact, none of them are exactly alike! Some are older, some are younger; all have different styles that make them unique. However, all reputable, professional DJ's do have some things in common.

Professional DJ's should:

- Wear proper attire
- Make announcements tastefully
- Be responsive to unique circumstances
- Have a sound system of commercial quality, which is attractive when set-up
- · Carry an extensive music selection
- Play a variety of musical styles
- Offer lighting systems, mirror balls and other special effects

Getting references:

Ask the DJ company for at least three references of couples who hired the DJ you are considering.

Call the people on that list and ask the following questions:

Did the DJ fulfill the commitment set out in the original agreement?

Was his/her tone, dress and choice of music appropriate for your wedding?

Was the music too loud? Did the lighting system work properly" Was the equipment attractive? In good shape?

Write down their answers so you remember what each person said regarding each DJ. Overall, if you get favourable responses, about a DJ, you are on the right track. If the responses indicate trouble, or if you don't readily receive a list of references, then keep looking further.

When you do hire your DJ, make sure to get a written contract that outlines the basic terms of your agreement, and lists any special requests you want to see happen during the reception.

Latin – Salsa and meringue put passion and fire into wedding day romance. The spicy rhythms will rouse your crowd for a remarkable party. Tito Nieves, Eddie Palmiere, Willie Colon and Ruben are popular artists.

R & B – From Motown faves to contemporary, cool R & B sounds get the group grooving. With artists like Barry White, Luther Vandross, Whitney Houston and Lauryn Hill, this genre is always in style and perfectly romantic. Swing – No one can sit still to the upbeat, heart-starting melodies of swing, Jump and jive to Count Basie, Duke Ellington, Benny Goodman and the Cherry Poppin' Daddies. Let your guests in on the plan early – they might need a lesson or two. (Bet your grandparents already know how to jitterbug)

Ballroom – Show off the benefits of high school dance lessons with a waltz, tango, foxtrot, cha cha kind of party. Explore your inner Fred and Ginger if you want a reception with a grand style. This theme makes it a top hat and high heels soireée.

Adventurous couples take the party further, past tradition with country, disco, hip-hop or world beat themes. Anything goes when the goal is a good time for all!

Work closely with designer to discover what type of lighting will work best in your space. Great lighting results in a room that is certain to impress and set the stage for a beautiful wedding day!


A wise consumer will shop for a reputable video studio. Start looking sooner than later and reserve a firm date as early as possible. This will require a deposit as competent videographers are generally booked months in advance.

Hiring a videographer is the perfect way to relive your special day and preserve it for generations to come. Videography also offers priceless, moving images and voices of loved ones who may not be here years from now.

Before booking a videographer though, there are a few important details to keep in mind.

Are you a fan of documentaries, or more the Hollywood love story type? Today, most videographers specialize in wedding videos that not only cater to individual tastes, but also transform couples into celebrities starring in their very own blockbuster movie.

Whether your dream video mirrors an independent film or music videos, gone are the days of hours of footage. Experts say most wedding videos are no longer than 90 minutes in length.











your invitations

Your wedding invitation is the first impression your guests have of the uniqueness that is your wedding style. The ultra-formal wedding dictates the use of a formal, standard size engraved invitation on white or ivory card stock. The wording is traditional, formal; including "requests the honour of your presence" and printed self-addressed, stamped envelopes for the reply card. The invitation is enclosed within a second envelope, separated by tissue. The wording varies only if the person is being invited to the ceremony only, the reception only or to the ceremony and reception together. All other wedding styles have wondrous choices; the invitation itself, the paper, the wording and the enclosures.

Paper can be brightly coloured, recycled paper, printed with a design and always carry the beginning of a theme wedding. The invitation sets the stage for the entire ceremony and reception. Most invitation specialists have thousands of choices. It's usually helpful if your have an idea of how formal you wish your invitation to be before you make an appointment. Your specialist can also help you with the proper wording for any of hundreds of circumstances and will have examples for you.

Order your invitations and announcements 4-6 months before the wedding. Know your exact quest count first. You will need an invitation for your parents, each husband and wife, each single guest over 16 years of age, each attendant, each attendant's parents, and the clergy. If you wish to send a "second round" of invitations to replace those who cannot attend, order those invitations at the same time you ordered the originals, as reorders can be extremely expensive. Order extra envelopes to allow for errors. For an additional fee, you can sometimes get envelopes early so that you can start addressing them.

Allow your calligrapher at least three weeks, longer if they are drawing the map insert. All persons' names are completely spelled out, with the exception of Dr., Mr., Mrs., Miss and Ms., and written in black ink. Check your invitations carefully when they come in. Invitations should be sent 6-8 weeks before the wedding. Most people are active and fill their calendars early.



inviting your guests

Your wedding invitation gives your guests a "sneak preview" into your wedding, so of course you will want to coordinate its style and colour to complement your attire and decor. You will find selections from traditional designs with formal wording to contemporary designs that incorporate your specially created message. Or, as many couples are now doing, you may choose to make your own invitation by hand with the assistance of a graphic designer.

Save the Date cards are a great way to introduce your engagement and the wedding date. This allows for your guests to block out your wedding day which will be in the future.

Seating charts have come in to their own and can be a stunning addition to your reception.

Formal wedding invitations are usually engraved and ordered well ahead to allow time for them to be addressed and mailed six weeks before the wedding. A $4 \frac{1}{2}$ " x $5 \frac{1}{4}$ " invitation is the most popular size, as it easily fits into an envelope without folding. A larger 51/2" x $7 \frac{1}{2}$ " invitation is used for very formal weddings.

Confer with your invitation designer, who will be able to show you various styles and appropriate wording. Remember, invitations are always written in the third person. Spell everything out, the wedding date, time, all numerals, and names. Abbreviations, initials and nicknames are never used except for Mr. or Mrs., Sr., Jr. Go through the guest list before ordering your invitations. You will need one for every married couple, each single adult guest, each attendant and their parents (if invited), your attendants' dates (if single), everyone in the groom's family, as well as your wedding officiate and guest.

Be sure to order extras for emergencies and keepsakes. Extra envelopes are a must for any mistakes you may make when addressing. Be sure to order response cards (RSVP) if you are planning on serving a meal; or arrange for a service to handle this task for you.

Remember to order thank-you notes in both your maiden and married name. You will want to send thanks for engagement and shower gifts, well before the wedding.



thank you NOTES

One of the duties after your engagement party, bridal shower or when the wedding day is over is to acknowledge each and every gift with a handwritten note of appreciation.

Write your notes on white or pastel paper, simple yet classy enough to voice your thanks.

Match them to your overall theme, if you choose customized invitations.

To help you keep a record of your gifts received, keep a book on hand from the time you start receiving engagement gifts. Allow space for the giver, the item received and a description of the gift and the date a thank you was sent.

The easiest method is to combine your invitation list and your gift list on the same page; this way addresses will be readily available as well.

Ideally, you should write each note as the gift arrives, so that you won't get behind. Regardless, all thank you notes must be sent within three to six months after your wedding.

In circumstances where a prompt note is impossible (such as a large wedding of over 200 guests), a printed acknowledgment is acceptable, but always followed by a handwritten note of thanks.

In 2020, it is perfectly acceptable for you and your spouse to share the task of writing the notes together.

As always, mention the specific gift, whether it be an item or a cheque in an envelope. Be warm and appreciative and show how much it meant to you both and perhaps how you intend to use the present received.

There may be a special need that a couple may fill through setting up their own charitable foundation. In order to do this properly, they will need to work with a lawyer with the expertise to create the correct legal and financial entity to be able to accept donations.

Whether the help to be focused locally, nationally, or globally, this non-traditional type of registry is likely to become more prevalent in future wedding traditions as brides and grooms share their social consciousness with their invited guests.

wedding favours & BOMBONIERE

The presenting of a wedding token is an adaptation of a 16th Century French custom that was reserved for nobles and kings.

The objects were originally of great value; gold, enamel, precious stones, ivory, mother-of-pearl or porcelain. When introduced into other European courts, handmade lace, hand blown glass and sugar coated candy were often substituted.

Today, chocolates or chocolate truffles are sometimes substituted, but more and more, you will see unique and interesting ideas at each table setting at the reception. Hot sauces, hand-milled soaps, hand-poured candles, roasted coffee beans and lottery tickets are, but some of the great ideas we have seen in the last number of years.

The favour itself is beautifully wrapped and tied with a ribbon. Personalized with the couple's name or initials, and wedding date, guest mementos add a charming touch to the festivities and make your wedding even more memorable for those attending.

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

All brides stand to the left. There used to be a good reason for the bride to take her place at the altar at the left-hand of the bridegroom and, on the way out of the church, to be on his left arm. Wedding Flowers: They are symbols of love and romance. Herbs represent fertility and fidelity. Ivy, which is used to trim the bouquet, represents solid love.

The Bridal Garter: In 14th century France, it was considered a token of good luck. To stop the wedding guests from wanting this item, a clever bride substituted her bouquet. Today, it should be thrown with eyes closed.

The Bridal Veil: The veil originated as a symbol of youth and virginity. Today, the lifting of the veil, for the first kiss, is symbolic of the removal of the last barrier between herself and her spouse-to-be.

The Wedding Cake: It was the custom in England that the wedding cake consist of small piles of cake, over which the married couple kissed. If the pile didn't topple, they were assured good luck. A Frenchman seeing this in England decided it would be easier to ice all of the little cakes into a large one- providing good luck always.

Take a few minutes to think about those special people in your life who will travel from far away to be with you on your wedding day. You will want to make their stay an enjoyable as well as a memorable experience.

Most out-of-town guests would prefer not to impose on those involved in the hectic wedding schedule. Make this easy for them by negotiating a group rate with

a local hotel, inn or student residence. Many hotels give discounts for groups of 10 or more guest rooms. First, let the hotel know approximately how many rooms your guests will require. Then, have a relative or a member of the wedding party coordinate the individual reservations. Many brides choose to send a letter to their out-of-town guests with the hotel's special room rate and reservation number so that each guest can arrange their own reservations. Be sure to inform your guests that they need to contact the hotel at least two weeks prior to the wedding.

By doing so, any rooms that are not booked can be



released and you will not be held accountable for them.

Remember, hotel accommodations are a special service you can provide for your out-of-town guests. While allowing your guests the privacy of their own room, hotels also enable them to spend time with other guests from out-of-town and to easily coordinate transportation to your wedding and parties.

In addition, the hotel concierge can arrange tours, shopping or most anything else your guests would enjoy while visiting the city of your wedding. This service lets your guests continue to enjoy their stay while you are off on your honeymoon.








wedding TOASTS

Toasts come to us from a 17th Century custom. Pieces of toasted bread or croutons were placed in the bottom of the glass to provide nourishment for the bride and groom. Toasts are an important part

of the cherished memories from the reception and are usually presented with both dignity and with a little humour.

Either the best man starts the toasts by standing and tapping his glass or the Master of Ceremony announces the toast. The best man usually tells a short story of how the couple first met or a humourous tasteful anecdote about the groom and the bride. He then makes a wish for their happiness and everyone (except the bride and groom) raises their glasses and toasts the couple.

Toasts may then follow his toast from the bride's honour attendant and then the bride and groom's

parents. The couple then follows with special toasts to their parents, to their attendants and finally to each other, usually with the groom speaking first. They may then intertwine their arms and drink from

their toasting glasses or goblets.

The amount of champagne needed for the toast is calculated as follows: A 26 oz. (magnum) of champagne will serve approximately 8 glasses. So for 100 guests, you will need a case of 12 per toast. Some toasts heard around the world are:

attendants' duties

Maid or Matron of Honour

Bride's right-hand woman

- ▼ Responsible for her own gown and accessories
- ▼ Helps arrange bridal shower
- ▼ Keeps record of shower and wedding gifts
- ▼ Acts as official witness
- ▼ Unofficially calms the bride's nerves
- ▼ Helps bridesmaids on wedding day
- ▼ Rearranges train before recessional
- ▼ Holds bride's bouquet and possibly gloves during ceremony
- ▼ Cares for bride's things at ceremony and reception
- ▼ Assists the bride when changing from her wedding gown to her going-away apparel

Bridesmaids

- ▼ Generally responsible for their own gowns
- ▼ Assist in pre-wedding festivities
- ▼ Wrap small gifts for the reception (optional)
- ▼ Fill cups with confetti, rice or rose petals to throw for the getaway
- ▼ Decorate the cars

Ring Bearer

▼ Walks down the aisle carrying the ring, or a substitute secured to a satin pillow

Flower Girl

- ▼ Precedes the bride, tossing paper petals or fresh flower petals down the aisle
- ▼ Her dress complements the bridesmaids' dresses

Best Man

Groom's right-hand man and problem-solver

- ▼ He's responsible for his tuxedo
- ▼ In charge of groom arriving on time
- ▼ He sees that ushers' function runs smoothly
- ▼ Gives toast and special speeches at ceremony and reception
- ▼ Pays the officiant's fee
- ▼ Keeps rings, license, and honeymoon tickets in a safe place
- Acts as toastmaster at the bridal table
- ▼ Plans for reception exit transportation

Ushers

- ▼ Responsible for their own attire
- ▼ Involved in all ceremony festivities
- ▼ Greet guests at the ceremony, ask which family they represent and seat them accordingly. Bride's family and friends sit on the left of the aisle and the groom's on the right.
- ▼ Usually two of the ushers unroll the aisle runner after the bride's mother is seated.

ist of things to do:	

wedding trivia

all brides stand to the left!

There used to be a good reason for the bride to take her place at the altar at the left-hand of the bridegroom and, on the way out of the church, to be on his left arm. This custom is not just a meaningless matter of etiquette. It enabled the groom to keep his right hand (and sword) free to defend his bride and himself from attack and capture by jealous rivals.

bridal photos

The first photograph of a bride was made in 1854 by a pair of 'daquerreotypists' named Southworth and Hawes.

a crummy tradition

In ancient Rome, the cake was broken over the bride's head after the wedding. The guests then gathered up the crumbs as good luck tokens. (We don't know what the bride did.)

the toast

In days of yore, a piece of toasted bread was placed in the bottom of a wine goblet, which then was passed to every guest. The last to receive it was the honoured lady. She ate the wine soaked toast and received everyone's compliments. The custom of sharing a drink then became known as a toast. The traditional toast to the newlyweds is "Health, Wealth and Happiness."

easy does it

There have been some unusual laws created concerning marriage. A 1775 law stated that a young women could not be married wearing any makeup. Makeup was considered ensnarement. If used, the wedding would not be legal because the groom would have been trapped by the illusion of makeup.

a standup man

The Best Man is a tradition that spanned many cultures. His job was to take the place of the groom and marry the bride if the groom did not show up to the wedding.

this is Sparta!

Stag parties were first held by ancient Spartan soldiers, who kissed their bachelor days goodbye with a raucous party.
